Political System and Danish Politics

Denmark is many things in one: It is a parliamentary representative democracy and a constitutional monarchy. It is a unitary state but it is also a highly decentralised country. It is a member of the European Union but has opted out of some aspects of European integration.

Denmark in Europe: Relationship with the EU and Europe

Denmark joined the European Economic Community in 1973 (together with the United Kingdom and Ireland). Its relationship with the EEC (and later the EC and the EU) has turned out to be complicated, not least since the Danes voted against the EU's Maastricht Treaty in 1992. Following that, Denmark received the right to opt out of various elements of European integration such as the Euro, the Common Security and Defence Policy, as well as Justice and Home Affairs. This session will explore Denmark's complicated relationship with the EU – an issue that is all the more topical considering Brexit.

In dramatic circumstances, Jorgen Vig Knudstorp, at the time a 33-year-old LEGO executive, told the owner time was running out and that he should be made CEO if the company was to be saved. Amazingly, LEGO's owner followed his advice. Knudstorp not only saved the company but also increased its turnover by 600 percent until he stepped down from his executive role in 2016 to become chair. The company is still very private, so we are delighted that LEGO's management have invited us to visit their spectacular new headquarters (built in the style of a LEGO brick house), meet their top executives, and show us their shop.

Copenhagen and Malmö are only 30 kilometres apart separated by the Öresund Strait. However, travel between the two cities was by ferry until 2000 when the Öresund Bridge and Tunnel opened. The Öresund Bridge is still the longest combined road and rail bridge in Europe. At a cost of €2.6 billion, the project was delivered without any taxpayer funding. The bridge is user-financed and the cost will be repaid by 2037.

Boat Tour to Middelgrunden Offshore Wind Farm Park

Location: Lautrupkaj 1, 2100 Copenhagen

The Middelgrunden Offshore Wind Farm was one of the first offshore wind farms in the world. It has a total capacity of 40 MW and 20 bonus turbines, each with 2 MW capacity. Middelgrunden Offshore Wind Farm supplies 3 percent of the electricity consumed in Copenhagen.

Ten of the wind turbines are owned by the energy company Orsted and the remaining 10 belong to Middelgrunden Wind Turbine Cooperative. This means a number of Copenhagen residents own a share of the turbines. More than 90 percent of all offshore wind turbines worldwide are made by Danish companies, who have vast experience in meeting the challenges of constructing offshore wind power plants.

Every day of the year, the Amager Resource Center relieves the inhabitants and companies of the five capital municipalities of their waste, and supplies heat and electricity to their households in return. Construction of a new state-of-the-art facility was completed in 2017. Now up and running, it is one of the best performing European plants in energy efficiency, waste treatment capacity, and environmental consideration, producing heat for 160,000 households and electricity for 62,500 residences. The facility also stands out for its award-winning architecture: the rooftop has green spaces for walking, running and even an artificial ski slope accessible to the public.

Christiania and guided walk

Christiania, the notorious freetown of Copenhagen, is without a doubt one of Denmark's most popular tourist attractions. Christiania was founded in 1971 when some locals cut a hole in the fence of the military barracks in Badmandsgade.

Today, many of the original settlers still live in the collectively controlled village, and the area has a clear '70s feel to it.

Around 1,000 people live in Christiania and more than 500,000 people come to visit every year. Many people living in Christiania have built their homes themselves, giving the area an interesting architectural look. Tourists can enjoy a variety of eco-restaurants, workshops, galleries and music venues offering all sorts of cultural experiences.

Christiania existed under special conditions for 40 years with constant conflicts and clashes between the locals and the Danish state. After many years of uncertainty, an agreement was signed in 2011 resulting in the Foundation Freetown Christiania on 1 July 2012.
